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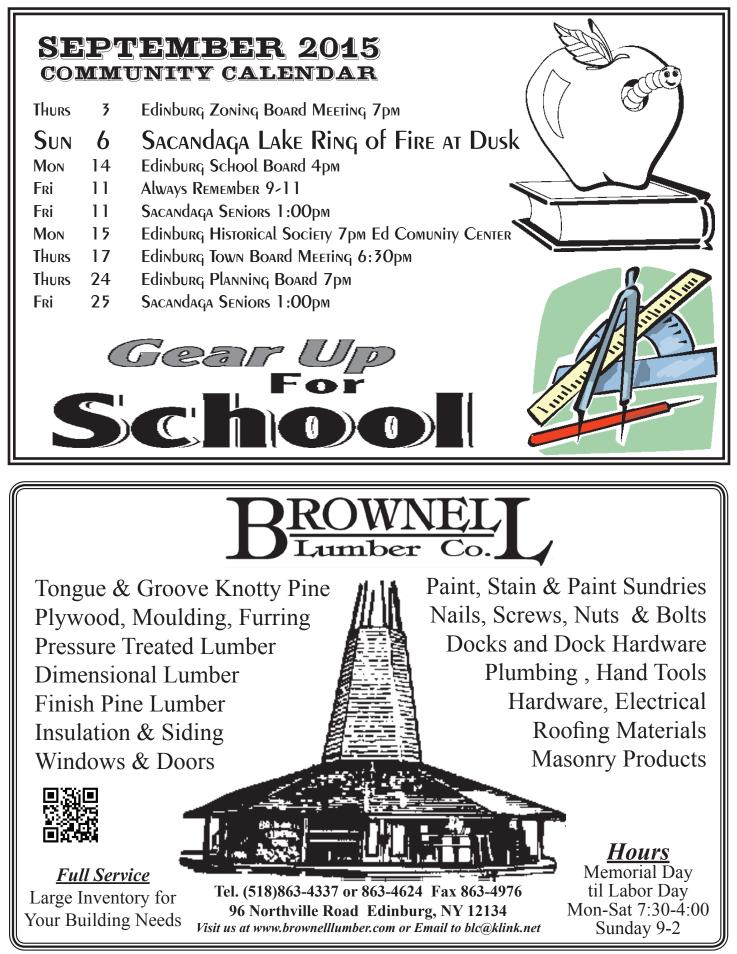
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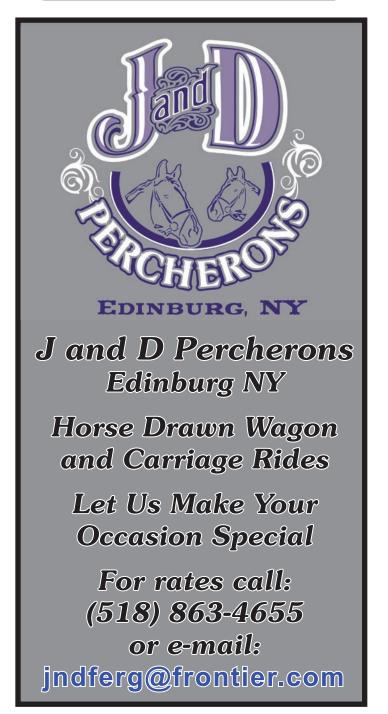

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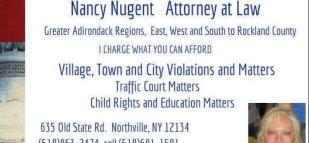


Edinburg Historical Society

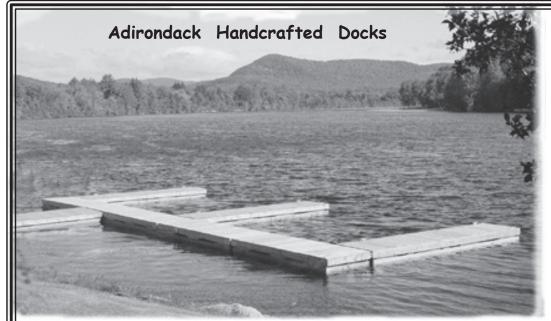

#### STAND UP FOR HEALTH!

The studies just keep coming. Sitting for long periods may be very bad for your health and even your life expectancy. Sitting too much may cause health problems even if you exercise regularly.

Researchers at the Mayo Clinic have found that the longer you sit, the higher your risk of developing such health issues as: High blood pressure

Heart disease (increases nearly 125%)

Type 2 diabetes

Weight gain

Stress intolerance

Many of us sit about 8 hours a day in a vehicle, before the TV, doing crafts or puzzles, or other sedentary activities. Sitting for long periods is known to cause large muscles to burn less fat, blood sugars and triglycerides to rise, and blood to flow more sluggishly.

Experts say that sitting can cause health problems even if you exercise regularly. So while a 30 minute swim or fast walk may be great for you, it may not undue 8 hours of sitting. If you do exercise for 30 minutes, remember your health is also affected by those other 23  $\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

So what can you do if you already have a health problem that limits your mobility? First, check with your doctor about what movements are best for you. He or she may even recommend a physical therapist to introduce you to safe exercises.

But don't stop there! You need to follow through and make a commitment to moving gently for a minute, or preferably two, each hour you are awake.

Experts advise:

Don't sit if you can stand. And,

Don't stand if you can move.

When you must sit for long periods, break it up with small active movements such as tapping your toes, seated heel or toe raises. Do lower leg raises or tighten muscles in your back, lower abdomen and/or buttocks.

Other tips for being more active include: Stand or move around while on the phone. While watching TV, remind yourself to stretch, tighten and release your muscles or get up and walk around for the length of a commercial and or at the end of the show.

Invite friends for a walk instead of a meal. Do ankle circles or shoulder roles while stopped at red lights.

Park further away from the store you want to visit.

Suggest breaks in long meetings or activities such as playing cards with friends, and

especially while riding in a vehicle. Get up and stretch or walk around and encourage others to do the same.

The impact of movement, even leisurely movement, can be profound for your health. The old adage, "move it or lose it," is a valuable tool for a healthy life!

#### **Annual GSLA Membership Meeting**

Our annual membership meeting at the Edinburg Fire Hall was a great success and a great planning tool for next year's activities.

The 'State' of the Association is Great! Membership is growing and newly implemented membership initiatives are working. Board member, Lynette Metz began last year with a direct mail solicitation to lake owners and moved it up a notch by organizing and implementing the successful GSLA booth at the Northville Rotary's Woodworking and Fine Arts Weekend. During the early summer, e-burst renewal messages were sent to previous members who were receiving e-bursts but had not renewed their membership. Some of these previous members had left the area but others were appreciative of the notice and renewed! We hope our records are more in line with the membership lists. If not, drop us an email!

The Association also received notice from our e-burst vendor that our recent e-message to membership warning of 'boat piracy' on the lake exceeded the open rate expected for not-for-profits! The timely updates on lake issues are gaining a lot of attention and praise from members! We promise to keep the notices coming .... Great Sacandaga Protection Committee (SPC) Update. Travis Mitchell, Co-Chair of the SPC, provided an overview of the group's legislative, level and lobbying efforts. is Chairman of the Great Sacandaga Lake Advisory Council (GSLAC) as well as a GSLA Board Member briefed the membership on the manner in which the GSLAC with monetary support from the GSLA, is funding the Lake Steward Program. It was reported that the stewards talk to an average of 100 skippers on each weekend day at the large boat launches at Broadalbin and Northville. Their message is simple ... let's work together to keep invasives out of the Great Sacandaga. Hopefully, everyone around the lake is reading from the same book ..."Wash, Clean and Dry" your boat before you launch on the lake and tell your friends and guests likewise.

Boat Noise and Speed on the Lake. As was the case last year, the biggest membership concern was boat noise and speed on the lake. In response to this concern, the GSLA invited a member of the Saratoga Sheriff's Department navigation unit to the meeting. The Deputy was GREAT! He explained his duties on the Saratoga County portion of the lake. He noted that the faster boats on the lake are capable of reaching 90 - 100 mph! Just to set the context: a regulation football field is 360

If some boats are truly traveling at 90 mph they would 'motor' over a football field in 2.7 seconds! Our discussion with the Deputy was a useful first step and provided what we hope will be the beginning of a thoughtful discussion on the issue and the promotion of safety on the lake.

Representatives from the Great Sacandaga Lake Association will be meeting with the Saratoga County Sheriff's Office to receive further information and share ideas on boater safety. The Association has spoken to representatives of lake groups and invites other lake organizations to share their thoughts on this issue with the GSLA with a goal of keeping boaters, swimmers and other lake users safe on the Great Sacandaga. We are interested in hearing from those GSLA members who were unable to attend and share their thoughts at the annual membership meeting.

#### Where do we go from here?

We are midway through the month of August. It is time for our Association to review its progress and growth during the first eight months of the year. We need to continue what has been successful and listen to our membership for future directions. We use the fall and winter months for planning and program development and seek member recommendations. The lake as a community is only as strong as we make it. Member comments are important to our Association. If you like what you read about the Great Sacandaga Lake Association and want to keep the GSLA as an informed voice on the lake, join! Association membership is open to everyone who enjoys the lake and is not restricted to permit holders. A \$25 family membership is a great deal (especially when it includes FREE boater safety classes)!

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DID YOU KNOW THAT by Town of Edinburg Historian, Priscilla L. Edwards

#### The first 25 years

Several years passed from the time Abijah Stark-the first recorded settler in what is now Edinburgh- and his wife Elizabeth and 2 children settled in 1787 on property located just north of the current Edinburgh/Providence town lines on South Shore Rd.

Prior to this time this territory was part of Balls Town (Ballston). It became part of Galway in 1792 and Providence in 1796. Providence held its first organizational meeting on the 1st Tuesday in April 1796 at the Baptist Meeting House. This included the people from what would become "Northfield" and later "Edinburgh". Many of the same men that were active in Providence politics would be the same in Edinburgh.

In the 1790's more and more families had settled along the Sacandaga River north of Abijah Stark's homestead. So many in fact that by 1801 these folks decided it was time to break away from Providence, creating a town of their own. March 13, 1801 saw the birth of the new town of "Northfield". In Oct. 1801 Samuel S. Barker of Providence billed Saratoga County \$1.25 for drawing up the petition for the Town of Northfield.

According to Edinburgh's original Town Records book the first organizational meeting was held on April 7, 1801 "for the purpose of choosing town officers at the dwelling house of James Goodwin".

Israel Woodford was elected town clerk for the year and Robert Sumner, supervisor. Willard





Trowbridge, Jordan Sprague and Jonathan Smith were chosen as assessors. From "Day One" in order to maintain a town and pay its expensestaxes must be raised-thus the need for assessors to determine the value of each land owners property.

Thurston Wells, Sampson Hosley and Ephraim Potter: elected commissioners of highways and Daniel Washburn Jr. and John Sumner: overseers of the poor.

Constables elected were Jordan Sprague and Abel Brown. The office of constable was quite important and carried much respect. His duties were to serve writs, tend to custody of jurors and keep the peace. Dialing 911 and expecting a state trooper or sheriff's deputy to be on the scene was a long way into the future in 1801. Edinburg no longer has a constable.

Jordan Sprague was elected to the important position of tax collector. Daniel Washburn Jr., Charles Rhodes, Joshua Wells, David Cole, Jonathan Townsend, John Hamilton, Arba Perry, Samuel Rogers, James Andrus, Reuben Cornell and Nathaniel Bass: overseers of highways.

The town was divided into road districts with an overseer or path master in charge of each district. The path master could hire the necessary man power-usually a neighbor along his section of road-to make necessary repairs and maintenance to the road.

James Goodwin, Elisha Mix and Daniel Washburn Jr. were elected fence viewers and damage prizers. Even in the early days of our town one was expected to put up fences around his property. The duty of the fence viewers and damage prizers was to check all fences on a regular basis, reporting all damages to the owner and the town. If the fences went un-repaired the owner was

at fault if a neighbor's animals wandered onto his property and did damage.

The pound keepers, William Fellow and Isaac Deming kept the pound to receive animals that wandered at will illegally.

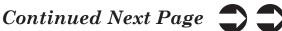
Two laws were voted into effect in 1801: voted to raise \$50. for support of the poor and that hogs shall run at large. The next annual meeting would again be held at the dwelling house of James Goodwin.

A special meeting was held for each road to be laid out. 4 roads were created in 1801 and one altered from the previous year.

On Nov. 9, 1801 a special meeting was held at Daniel Washburn's for the purpose of consulting proper means to build a bridge over the Sacandaga River near Jonathan Anderson's. Vote passed. This bridge crossed the river in the general area of the Anderson school house on S. Shore Road, hitting the western shore of the river just north of the Northampton town line.

1802 saw a few changes in town-5 more roads were laid out with highway overseers increasing in number to 13. Once again \$50. was to be raised in taxes to support the poor. Jordan Sprague was to keep Wm. Clark at 17 shillings per week per year. Hogs could continue to run at large but with a "good and sufficient yoke". Boar hogs could not run (after2 months old) between May 1 and Dec. 25. Any running during this time- the owner will be fined a \$1. per hog or forfeit the hog. Ram sheep will not run at large-if so the owner will also be fined \$1. or forfeit the sheep.

The reason for these laws? Hogs dig with their snouts and can totally destroy a garden-thus the reason for a yoke. Boar hogs have tusks and can be very dangerous, even attacking humans as well as destroying crops. A law passed in 1829 required

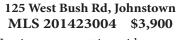

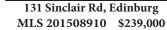

a ring in the nose of any hogs running at large to prevent damage. Ram sheep also have horns which again can be very dangerous to humans if allowed to run at large.

There were not many changes with the 1803 meeting. It was approved to pay \$5. to a person for each wolf killed in town. Wolves could be a real problem as they preyed on farmers' livestock. Two more roads were also laid out.

In 1805 approval was made to build a pound but it would be 1816 before \$40. was raised to build one 40' square and was built in Ely Beecher's barnyard with Ely apparently becoming the permanent pound keeper. The money in the hands of the overseer of the poor was to be paid to the supervisor to defray town expenses. \$50 was still raised each year for support of the poor and more and more roads continued to be built or altered.

By 1807 the number of fence viewers had increased from 3 to 8 and were to be paid 6 shillings per day for their work. The following year they were to receive 75 cents per day.

Several changes in 1808- Northfield became Edinburgh as another town of Northfield was discovered in NYS. James Goodwin, who had hosted the annual meetings for years now operated an inn. Meetings continued to be held at the inn for many more years. \$60. was taken from support of the poor (this was obviously in excess of what was needed to care for the poor) to repair bridges and bad roads.

A NYS legislative act in 1812 created a public school system state-wide. The annual meeting of 1813 established a Commission of Schools consisting of John Younglove, Guy Culver and Ephraim Potter. John Goodwin, Ely Beecher and Willard Trowbridge were selected as Inspectors of Schools. \$80. was to be raised for the benefit of the common school. Taxes were an issue in 1819 when a committee-John Hamilton, Solomon Slate, Samuel Stimson Jr. and Ely Beecher- were chosen to examine the claim of Alexander St. John and others, that they were paying taxes twice on their land in Edinburgh. Land was also broken off from Edinburgh in 1919 to form the Town of Day.

The assessed value of Edinburgh in 1820 was \$169,373.

Voters-at a special meeting in 1825-voted unanimously not to comply with an act of the NYS Legislature to build a county poor house. Voters petitioned to have the Town of Edinburgh exempt from the law.

Mar. 7, 1826 marked 25 years since our town was established and annual meetings were held. The meeting was held at Goodwin's Inn-now run by James son, Harvey. Ely Beecher was still the pound keeper. Ram sheep and hogs still ran at large under the specific rules established many years before. Some things had changed-many more roads now existed, requiring maintenance. The number of highway overseers had risen to 28. The population had increased by a couple hundred more residents.

The future would see many more changes.

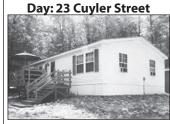

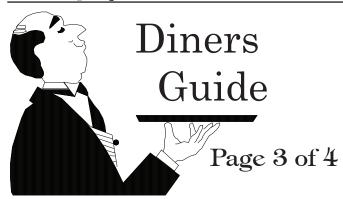

## Why We Wave By Patricia A. Nugent

I've clocked over 5000 hours walking my various dogs on the beautiful North and South Shore roads. That's given me a lot of time to think about how we share public roadways.

I used to think it was quaint when walkers along the GSL waved to cars, something unique to small, friendly, mountain towns. I now realize that it's a survival strategy when you're up against a powerful machine careening in your direction.

And so, I myself have become a waver. One of those people who waves at people they don't know as they pass by in their vehicles. Because now I understand



that we wave to make sure that drivers see us.

I don't want to cause a distraction, but I do look to see if drivers wave back. That indicates they're not checking emails or talking on their phone or whatever. The road and, hence, my dog and I have their attention.

The shoulder is narrow, less than thirty inches wide, with as much as a three-inch drop from the pavement to the narrow strip of sandy dirt. As we try to stay clear of the roadway, we often teeter on the edge of that precipice. I've turned my ankle more than once by slipping off the pavement to get out of the way of oncoming traffic.

I've made an informal study as to what type of driver best shares the road with walkers. At the risk of grossly over generalizing, very young and very old drivers tend to stand their ground and hug their lane. My hypothesis is that the former doesn't think anything bad can happen; the latter is anxious about crossing over the yellow line. Middle-aged drivers are more likely to move over a few inches for the walker. Motorcyclists are considerate, although for their own safety they often nod rather than return the wave; they know the perils of sharing the road. Big rigs, pick-up trucks, and those hauling something almost always give us a wide berth. They know that by doing so, they're also protecting themselves.

Dogs are unpredictable. A critter (dead or alive), an odor, a sound can drastically alter their course. The same is true of young children. Drivers who are afraid to hover over the yellow line or can't because there's an oncoming car could at least slow down. Better yet, do both. It's a frightening feeling to have a car whiz past you at 50mph when you're stuck between a gully and the road. Yet, there are many drivers whose behavior suggests they're annoved that they have to share the road with walkers. Because there are no sidewalks along the shore roads, the road is the only walkway accessible us. The new Batchellerville Bridge with its wide sidewalk is a delight to walk, although most of us have to drive there to walk it. Until we have "complete streets," we're stuck sharing the same corridor.

On a (somewhat) related note, those who have invisible fences that (supposedly) restrain their dogs should make sure the system is foolproof – that the dog is fully trained to respect the boundary and that the shock is sufficient for the size of the dog. Twice, a Rottweiler broke free, challenging my dog and me, forcing us into oncoming traffic that luckily saw us and pulled into the other lane. It's terrifying enough to have a dog charge the property line but to have him escape into the road is potentially life-threatening to all concerned.

After toileting her on our own property, I walk my dog every day to exercise her. I also walk for my own cardiac health and overall fitness, exchanging

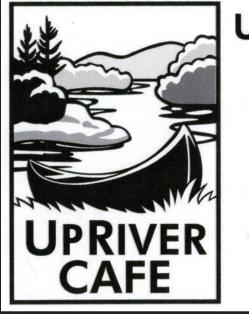


pleasantries with other walkers and bicyclists. We accommodate each other. We must hope that all vehicles will do the same.

It's dangerous out there. So please let us know we're in your line of vision.

And now I'm wondering why boaters don't wave to each other as much as they used to. \* \* \*

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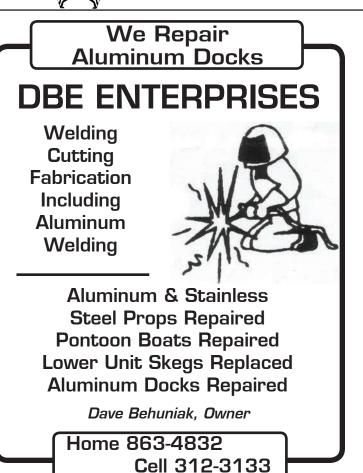

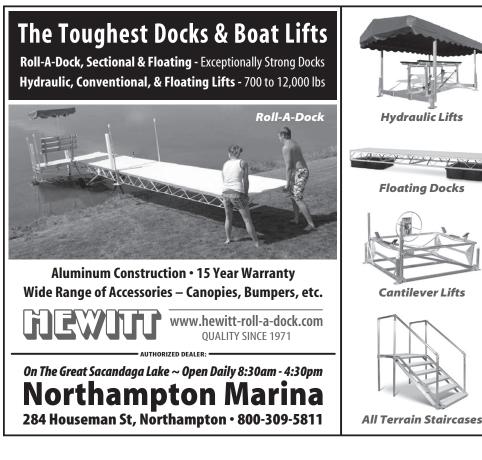
## Seventh Annual Walleye Challenge Ice Fishing Tournament Gives Back To The Great Sacandaga Lake

Representatives of the Seventh Annual Walleye Ice Fishing Tournament presented a \$1,500 check, as well as \$547 from a special raffle raised by Lou Stutzke, to the Great Sacandaga Lake Fisheries Federation for fish stocking this fall. The Walleye Challenge this year was held on held on January 31 on the Great Sacandaga Lake. Event cocoordinator Lou Stutzke (Owner of Fuel-N-Food of Mayfield), and Director of Tourism, Gina DaBiere-Gibbs, presented the check to Randy Gardinier of the Great Sacandaga Lake Fisheries Federation at a recent ceremony at the Fulton County Visitors Center in Vail Mills.

The tournament registered 1750 fishing enthusiasts with approximately 54% of participants from outside of Fulton County from eleven states and various parts of New York State. As summer ends and things quiet down don't forget that we're here year-round. Our Sunday worship service is at 8:45AM, followed by breakfast at the diner.

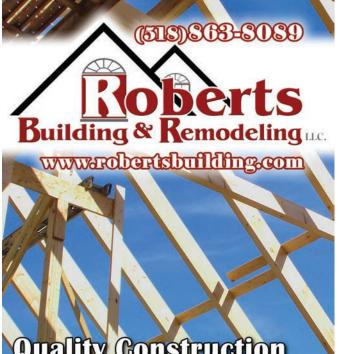

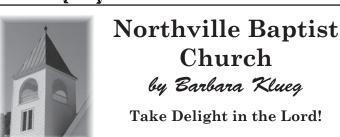
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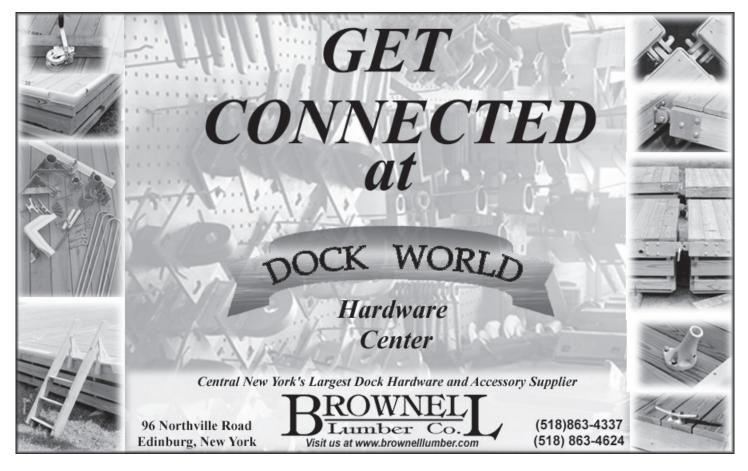
Today I took my granddaughter, Genevieve, on a Grandma Date to celebrate her 16th birthday. Our Grandma Dates started a few years ago when I couldn't decide what birthday gift to purchase. It's your birthday!" So off we drove to Walmart. Later, pulling out of the Walmart parking lot I asked her, "Where now?" And she asked, "Can we go to Target" to which I said, "Of course we can. To the very end of that special day, when the birthday girl asked if we could get some ice cream, my answer was, "Of course we can. It's your birthday!" 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On Saturday July 11, the GSLFF in conjunction with the Fulton County Baseball and Sports Hall Of Fame unveiled a new historical marker recognizing a previous North American record Northern Pike. The famous DuBuc pike

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was caught on September 15th 1940 in the Great Sacandaga Lake. The pike measured 52 ½" long and had a girth of 25". The weight was 46 lbs. 2oz..This fish is 6 ounces heavier than a pike caught in Minnesota in 2002. The world record now recognized by the International Game Fish Association is 55 pounds caught in Germany in 1986. The marker is slated to be placed roadside in a September ceremony around the 75th anniversary date the fish was caught.

This year we are having a raffle for a kayak that has been donated by the Sport Island Pub. The raffle will be held at the conclusion of our fishing contest on September 12, 2015 at the Sport Island Pub. Winner need not to be present to win.
