





Hope Valley Farms Ready For Spring Plants

It will soon be time to start thinking about your plans for the garden this season. Before you set out for the greenhouse or nursery to purchase plants, there are a few things to consider. If you are thinking about hanging or deck planters, it is important to realize that all 10" containers do not have the same amount of planting media in them! Some chain stores sell plants in 10" baskets that only have 1.6 gallons of media while a quality grower will use a 10" container which holds 2.0 gallons of media! The larger volume container will hold more water, retain it longer, hold more fertilizer nutrient, and insulate the roots of the plant better from the summer heat. A quality plant is grown in an organic media which retains water and nutrient significantly longer that the artificial media found in most chain store and greenhouse plants. You will typically find a healthier and more developed root mass in plants grown in a compost based media. The most important part of the plant is not the part that you see above the soil, but rather the roots you don't see below the surface.


Be aware that the beautiful plants you take home with you will require some nourishment each week just as you need to eat also! The constant process of watering and then drying out, leaches the nutrients out, and they must be replace on a regular basis. The process of the media drying out between watering causes it to draw away from the sides of the container. Then, when its watered, the water can run down the sides and out the bottom causing you to think the container is saturated when it has not yet been rehydrated. Think in terms of a quart of water instead of a teacup of water.

Lastly, take note of how many plants you are getting for your money in that "bargain" basket or flat. Your local grower knows the history and quality of their material and is not merely turning over a commodity item produced in Central or South America and shipped here for resale. Plus, your local grower is always ready to answer your questions about choosing the appropriate plants as






Use Caution Before You Sign Any Contract

Face it. At some point, if you haven't already, you're going to sign a contract. Whether it be

Once you sign the contract, you are bound unless the contract contains language allowing you to cancel, which is highly unusual. The only exception is if you sign a contract in your own home. In this situation, you may have a three-day right of rescission.

Many of us are under the impression that we can cancel a contract for any reason. Wrong! Even if you fall ill, lose your job, or just decide that you don't want to buy that TV set, you are bound and will most likely lose your down payment or, even worse, be responsible for the full balance of the terms of the contract.

Do your homework! Consumer contracts, such as one with a home improvement contractor, continue to present problems. Situations where an unscrupulous contractor obtains a large down payment or advance and then fails to show up are unfortunately too common. Our suggestion is to carefully check the references of such individuals. A call to the Better Business Bureau may be the best use of time expended by you during the entire transaction. Also check his or her references with other customers who have used the contractor's services.

Another bit of advice is to advance as small a sum as possible until either materials are delivered or work has commenced. Never advance the entire amount of the contract. Usually 10 percent to 20 percent of the amount upon signing the contract is more than sufficient. As the project progresses, more can be advanced in stages as each stage is successfully completed.

Never pay the full balance due until the job is completed. Always "hold back" a sum of money



until every aspect of the contract is accomplished. Remember, document review of six pages or less is provided at no charge under your Legal Plan. Before you sign such a legally binding agreement, call the National Legal Office or fax us a copy, and our plan attorneys will discuss your rights and obligations under its terms.

Frontier Telephone Area Code Overlay

Frontier will be adding an additional area code 838, in the 518 service area. This will be done with an overlay which will require all numbers dialed in 518 & 838 to be dialed using all 10 numbers, area code plus the 7 digit number. Effective March 18th you may begin dialing 10 digits and beginning August 19th you MUST use all 10 digits. You will have to be certain that all stored numbers, in cell phones, fax machines, alarm systems etc. contain all 10 digits. All printed materials that contain a phone number will have to include the area code.


World War I America Enters the War

Part 2

Germany announced the continuation of unrestricted submarine warfare on January 31, 1917. The German Kaiser wanted to starve Great Britain out before the United States could get necessary supplies to them. On March 18, three American merchantmen were sunk cutting even shorter the shipping losses of the Allied forces; Britain allowed their very survival was at stake. In the meantime a revolution in Russia put a government in office pledged to democratic reforms that would support the allies.

On April 2, 1917 President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress to declare war on Germany, stating that Germany's U-boat campaign was "warfare against mankind" and declared the

Allied crusade was to make the world "safe for democracy". Congress declared war on Germany April 6, 1917 and on Austria-Hungary on December 7, 1917.

The U.S. immediately formed a naval convoy along with an anti-submarine warfare policy, laying a large mine barrier across the North Sea. This immediately cut back the shipping losses to Great Britain.

Congress-on May 18-passed a Selective Service Act that required all men between the ages of 21 and 30 to register for military service. This draft later included men between 18 and 45. This was based on the premise that basic agricultural. industrial and educational activities not be disrupted during wartime. Conscientious Objectors are those who refuse to enter the service on moral or religious reasons. The Selective Service Act of 1917 only recognized CO's on religious grounds only. In all roughly 2.8 million men were drafted before the end of the war with about the same enlisted as volunteers. Before the end of 1917 180,000 US troops had arrived in France.

In Edinburg 130 men between 18 and 45 had registered for the draft by August 1917. It was called the "Militia Enrollment List" and town clerk Charles L. Brooks was in charge of the required information which included name, address, age, date of birth and occupation.

Unfortunately the Town of Edinburg nor Saratoga County have a list of Edinburg men who served in WW I. Of the 130 men mentioned above I have only the names of eleven that I know served from Edinburg. There are twenty-one WW I veterans buried in our Edinburg cemeteries but not all of them came from Edinburg.

The Edinburg men who served in WW I were: Albert Blowers (1895-1976) was the son of Walter and Ella Blowers. In 1915 he was a farm laborer living with his parents. Sometime after this his family moved to the Town of Northampton and after the war Albert married a Hattie Williams. He is buried in the Clarkville Cemetery.

George L. Edwards (1893-1966) was the son of Frank and Annabelle Edwards. Back in civilian life after the war in 1925 George-we all knew him as "Bug"- was a sawmill laborer living on Fox Hill Rd. with his wife, Cora and 10 year-old son, Erwin "Toot" Conklin. George is buried in the Edinburg



a Myrtle Barnes after the war and possibly lived in the Town of Day. He's buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Sherman Bovee Frasier (1897-1960) was the son of Grant and Rosalie Frasier. Before the war in 1915 he was a farm laborer. In 1925 Sherman, age 27, was a garage mechanic living at home with his parents. He's buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Emmett Charles Lawrence (1887-1930) was the son of William and ____Lawrence. In 1915, age 27, he was a farm laborer living at home with his father and siblings. In 1925 Emmett, age 42, was a farmer living on Jenkins Rd. He is buried in the Edinburg Hill Cemetery.

Nelson E. Morris (1870-1940) was the son of John and Minnie Cady Morris of Fox Hill. In 1925 Nelson, 34, was a sawmill laborer living on Fox Hill Rd. with his wife, Lucy. He is buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Walter Morris (1897-1979) was the son of William H. and Hattie Shaw Morris. In 1915 Walter was a farm laborer. After the war Walt, 25, was a sawmill laborer also living on Fox Hill Rd. with his wife Grace, son Gordon; daughters Madeline and Beulah. Walt is buried in the

Jay A. Swears (1895-1976) possibly from the Town of Day. After the war in 1925 Jay, 28, was a sawmill laborer living on the River Rd. (now N. Shore Rd.) with his wife Bertha A. and six-month old daughter, June Mary. He is buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Otto Tange (1892-1961) was the son of Ewald and Augusta Tange. In 1915 Otto was a farm laborer. In 1925 Otto, 32, was a sawmill laborer living with his parents on the Lower Rd.(now Tange Rd.) Otto never married. He is buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Leon VanAvery (1895-1918) was the son of Burr and Ella Tennant VanAvery. On October 25, 1918 Leon died at a military base hospital at Camp Merritt, NJ of the Flu that ran rampart in the US and Europe during 1918-19. Leon had suffered from the flu for several weeks before it developed into pneumonia. He's buried in the Clarkville Cemetery.

Harry Russell Varney (1898-1958) was the son of Rensselaer and Lillian W. Varney. He was born in Batchellerville and in 1915 was a road laborer living at home with his parents. After the war Harry lived for a short time on Horse Hill Rd. before he and his wife, Anna moved to Corinth where Harry worked at International Paper's Hudson River paper mill. He is buried in the Edinburg Cemetery.

Another veteran was Harry Johnson (1891-1973). Not an Edinburg native Harry was the son of Simon and Lucretia Cook Johnson. He moved to Edinburg about 1930 and spent the rest of his life doing carpentry and farm work. He married Jessie Snow. Harry is buried in the Prospect Hill Cemetery in Northville.

The other WW I veterans buried in Clarkville Cemetery we know very little about:

Louis Hatchey, born in Canada (1892-1968). Louie came to this area after the war to work on the Sacandaga Reservoir project. He lived in the Town of Northampton. We always remember Louie as being a very "sharp dresser" whenever he went to town or out with friends. Each year a Canadian flag is placed on his grave when the American

flags are placed on our US veterans in Edinburg's cemeteries.

If any of my readers know of other Edinburg men that were WWI veterans or if you can add to what I've written I'd really appreciate in knowing. CHRONIC DISEASE SELF-MANAGEMENT

According to Stanford University, most of us will experience two or more chronic long-term illnesses during our lives. In the event that we don't, it is still likely that we will provide care to someone that does.

Chronic health problems usually come on slowly unlike acute health problems. They can be things like heart disease, diabetes, depression, liver disease, bipolar disorder, emphysema, and many other conditions. These conditions may cause emotional distress, such as frustration, anger, anxiety, or a sense of helplessness.

It is important for the person who is suffering from a chronic condition, or the person who is trying to manage a chronic condition, understands the disease. There are often specific skills that are needed to deal with an illness. Some examples of skills that may be used include knowing what medications to take and how to take them, how to use oxygen or equipment like a C-pap machine, or how to check your blood glucose.

Finally, Stanford teaches us that people with chronic disease should know that you are not to blame. Chronic diseases are caused by a combination of genetic, biological, environmental, and psychological factors. You don't have to handle it alone, in fact you shouldn't. One of the side effects of chronic illness is a feeling of isolation. Support groups, talking with others on the phone, or even reading an article can be helpful.



Remember that you are more than your disease and sometimes illness can be an opportunity. Illnesses may make us slow down, evaluate what is really important, and cause us to shift our priorities. If you suffer from a chronic disease, I encourage you to become more informed on how you can self-manage your condition.

Stanford University's Chronic Disease Self-Management Program is taught by trained peer leaders. The program requires some commitment as the classes are 2 ½ hours each and meet weekly for 6 weeks. Participants will learn specific tools to improve their quality of life. If you are a caregiver to someone that suffers from a chronic disease, you are also encouraged to attend this program to improve your quality of care.

I was reminded recently of how a Christian awakening can totally change an individual from the throes of materialism, bigotry, cruelty, and selfishness to a life pursuing the teachings of Christ. John Newton was once a slave trader and captain of brutal African slave ships. He lived an early life of serving as his brother's tormentor, not his brother's keeper. His only concern was himself. Newton did eventually become awakened through several life-threatening events and subsequently became an Anglican minister and later, an avid abolitionist. His awakening can be summarized in the first verse of his most famous hymn:

"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found, was blind, but now I see."

I wish all peoples, Christian or not, a loving and peace filled life this Easter season and continued awakenings to God's word and expectations. That with God's help and grace, we will truly serve as keepers of our brothers and sisters, and that we share compassion, charity, and love with them ALL, regardless of race, religion, gender, gender identity, or station in life. And as always, I thank God for the opportunity to share my thoughts in our great country and for my new life and community in the Presbyterian and Reformed churches.

The kindergarteners have learned how to turn letter and sounds into words, and have learned many sight words as well. They are improving their skills everyday by practicing their reading and are now beginning readers and writers!

For independent reading, each student chooses a leveled reader and practices throughout the week in school and at home. They are also blending sounds and reading words that contain /sh/, /ch/, and /th/.

In math, the class is using their understanding of numbers and basic addition by solving real world problems, such as situations in the classroom. because I know he is in a safe place.

After I moved dad into his new home. I started going through his house. I had to do it all alone and it was a daunting task. After days of sorting through papers, cleaning out drawers and closets I thought I was mostly done with what I had to do. Two nights before I had to leave, I found yet another box to go through. When I opened it up, I found pictures that were cut out from old photo albums. I smiled, laughed and cried as I made my way through them all. I realized that when mom knew she was sick; she created a memory box. I took it to dad and showed it to him. He had been telling me for years he did not know where his pictures from the service were and they were all in this box. When I showed it to him he told me he already knew about it and he was angry that she took away his pictures. I had to tell him several times she did not do it out of anger she did it out of love. She wanted to remember her family, her friends and moments that were important to her. I had to remind him of that several times before he started to look at it differently. The pictures brought me great comfort and after going through it with dad, I hope it brings him comfort too. Sometimes we are to close to things and we need to take a step back and look at what is happening from the other person=s perspective.
